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FROM Mill Pond to Memorial Arena 1880-1950

The problem of maintaining facilities for wholesome recreation has been a task for community leaders in all generations. That the leaders of this community have in all years tackled this problem with vigor and results is borne out by recounting the history of recreation in our town since its incorporation. Each having served its day in this town, many tennis courts, baseball diamonds, lacrosse fields and hockey cushions have been built and have catered to the young and old of this community.

Today, however, our thoughts turn more intently to the rinks which have served our generations, both past and present. About 1880 a roller rink was built by Catley Lawlor. This was a source of pleasure for the young of this community and it is recorded that Jack Dale became very proficient in roller skating. That his prowess did not go unnoticed is borne out by the records which tell of a few men headed by Robert Scott, Sam Ellis and others, who raised a sum of money and allowed young Dale to participate in the Ontario Roller Skating Championships which he won about 1885. It is believed that he went on to win the Canadian Championship in that year or the next. Thus one of Alliston's boys brought fame and credit back to the town and to those who made possible his career.

About the same time a covered rink was built by one, John Wilson, on Church Street North, on the flat land just south of Boyne River. Coal oil lamps lighted this building and it was enjoyed by young and old alike until it was burned about 1887.

In 1888, and for some years after, ice skating was done on the mill pond. The enthusiast sat on a stump to put his or her skates on, but not to take them off. They usually came off themselves, one at a time, when the performer was in motion! The blades were known as "spring skates" because they were not attached to the boots as they are now.

Some coal oil, a match and a stump were the utensils used to supply heat and the skaters could get toasty-warm, either back or front — if they could get close enough to the fire. That was before the hockey stick and rubber puck were invented. The playing equipment consisted of a shinny and a tin can; the goal posts were two piles of overcoats.

An open air rink was built west of the Canadian Pacific tracks on the north side of Victoria Street. A small building, about twenty feet from the side walk, was used by the skaters for puting on their skates and for taking them off and for thawing out. There was no charge to get into the building from the street. The proprietor stood at the inner door and collected for the privilege of stepping on the ice, if you were on skates. If not, there was no charge. The only time there was free admission was when the manager put a stick in the stove and had his back to the door! The management changed several times as the years went by, Joseph Walker, Harry Ross and W. J. Wood had their turn. Admission was five cents but it was raised to ten cents on carnival nights. From 6:30 to 7:30 in the evening boys ringing a bell would walk the streets calling at intervals, "Rink open tonight! Ice in good condition!" For this performance they were given free admission.

Some fancy dress and speed skating carnivals were held when admission was boosted in order to provide prize money to attract speed skaters from distant towns. A purse of \$50, consisting of \$25 as first prize, \$15 second and \$10 as third prize, was offered for the one mile open race. At times, the entries were so large that the race was split with first and second in each

heat meeting in the finals. These events brought together Speed Skaters Shields and Booth, Orangeville; Woolmer and McLeod, Collingwood; and McCallister, Barrie. A few years later Grant and Jack McKnight, Billie Mitchell, Bob Freeman and Charlie Norton were some of the speedsters from Alliston.

The best lady skaters were Nellie McCrae and Gert Dryden. The following excelled in hockey: Charlie and Wilty Norton, Bob Rennick, Jack Mullen, Herb Doyle, Frank Riley, Roderick McCrae, Tommy Donnelly, Andy Dryden, Tony Greatriax, Billy McGirr, Walter Stone, Frank and Ross Hurst, Tom Morrow and Tommy Brown. Two imports at that time were: Jack McKnight from Essa Township and Frank Atcheson from Nicolston Village.

The third rink to be operated in Alliston was on land at the southeast corner of Paris and Nelson Streets. This land, according to records available, was owned by John Stewart, James Dinwoody and the estate of John Irvine. It was bought by a stock company who appointed T. M. Brown, Robert Scott and James Morrison as trustees. The company purchased this land in the spring of 1900 for \$200. Some of its members, who dug down into their socks to make this possible, were T. M. Brown, W. G. Fisher, W. A. J. Bell. Robert Scott, Dr. W. J. Hill, Dr. Harper,

Dr. McClusky, Hugh Wright, Tom Morrow, John Strachan, John Norton, George Dale, W. D. Latimer, R. J. Wallace, J. R. Hipwell and many others whom my informant is unable to recall. This rink, about 80 by 150 feet, was designed to accommodate both skating and curling. The ice surface of the rink was about 60 by 150 feet with a ten-foot sheet of curling ice on either side. Waiting rooms, etc., were at the north end of the ice. A chap who lived in the house now occupied by A. Venables was caretaker of this rink for many years. He was known as Joe Wilson.

Of the shareholders of this rink built in 1900, only two are still alive: R. J. Wallace now living in Swansea, and J. R. Hipwell. Of those days Mr. Wallace has the following to say:

"We had a flourishing curling club for many years. A fine hockey club was organized after the erection of this rink and it developed some very competent players who brought considerable fame to the town as a sporting centre in the country and district. The referees in those days were very liberal as to rules and the boys had to be tough to stand the pace, particulary when Tottenham, Cookstown, Collingwood or Barrie came for a return match. Among the outstanding boys in the game at that time, I can recall the Morrow boys, Tom, Charlie and Fred, the Norton boys, Charlie and Harry, Frank and Fred Hurst, Joe Bergin, Jud Ellis, Harry Merner, There were many others whose names I cannot recall.

I am quite sure none of those who promoted this rink made a fortune out of their investment nor even expected a cash dividend but all were amply repaid by the good fellowship that we had in the old rink."

After a hockey match the curling sections could not be used for a few days until the tobacco juice and cigar butts were cleaned off the ice. A band was in attendance each Friday night and at all carnivals and hockey games.

George Sims played goal and beat the bass drum. When a hockey match was on, he was the busiest man at the rink, playing goal during the game and beating the drum during intermission.

Just previous to the turn of the century when seven-man hockey and no substitutes was in vogue, seven players from Alliston were taken to Guelph to play for the Guelph Nationals. This team won the Championship of Ontario in the intermediate series. The players were Jack and Lou Carmichael, Tom Morrow, Fred Mackay, Bob Rennick, Bill Mitchell and Bob Morrison.

At that time travelling was done on the Grand Trunk Railway. On one occasion the local hockey club, when playing in Collingwood, had an extended trip of six days, being held up by a storm.

In 1902, Alliston's hockey team did exceptionally well in the junior series. Alliston played home-and-home games in the play-downs with Penetanguishene, goals to count on the round. The teams were tied after the home-and-home series and in the play-off, Alliston lost in a close game. Penetanguishene went on to lose to Upper Canada College who won the championship. Bill Mullen, Frank Clifton, Fred Hurst, Bill Allen, and Fred Morrow were some of the players of that time. Frank Clifton went on to play professional hockey at Sault Ste. Marie. Herb Trimble was

another player who advanced to professional ranks, playing for Cleveland and Pittsburg.

For carnivals and speed skating, the curling ice could be opened and incorporated with the hockey ice surface. An annual event New Year's night was a hockey game, Alliston Old Boys of Toronto versus the local team. The game was always followed by an oyster supper. Keen rivalry existed between the teams; the rink would be crowded to capacity by hockey fans. Toronto took many of the Alliston players and some of those who made the New Year's trip back to the home town were: Jack and Lou Carmichael, Hickey McDougal, Charlie Morrow, Bob Rennick and Bill Williams.

About this time, Duckey Newton played goal for the Lindsay Midgets who won the Junior Championship of Ontario.

In December, 1909, the board of trustees sold this rink to Alf. Bayeroft for \$750. He operated it until 1915 when he demolished this old building and in its place built a semi-circular

truss frame covered with corrugated iron. The cost of this structure was about \$6,000. It had an ice surface of 70 by 160 feet with standing room at either side and two catwalks raised about nine feet. This is the building which is well remembered by most townsfolk and while it had its good and bad seasons, it served this community until it was condemned in 1946. This rink was officially opened on January 1st, 1916, with a hockey match between Weston and Alliston, the final score being Alliston 7, Weston 6.

Mr. Baycroft continued to operate this rink until his death. For the next few years it was operated by his son, Harry, with a manager. During the Baycroft regime box lacrosse began to replace field lacrosse and the Alliston sporting fraternity began battling it out in such company as Huntsville, R. C. Signals, Camp Borden; Orillia, Owen Sound, Orangeville and Camp Borden Flyers. Players registered in the fall of 1932 were: Pete Hancey, William Moore, E. B. Gibson, Norman, George Baker, J. E. Baker, Ross Williams, A. T. Stephenson, John Heydon, Jack Doyle, Fred Hall, Hec. McKenzie, E. E. Burns, Donald Graham and Rowland Preston.

For a few years previous to 1944, the rink was operated under lease by the Lions Club. About that time Harry Baycroft was determined to sell and as there was no organization in town with authority or funds to buy it immediately, it was purchased by a public spirited citizen, Harry Solomon, for \$700. This was in February, 1944, and in a few days canvassers were on the streets trying to raise enough money to purchase the rink for the town. In a few days the money was forthcoming and Mr. Solomon was given \$700 and the title to the rink was once again in the name of the Mayor of the Town of Alliston, Apparently the subscribers were quite generous, for the following fall the entire inside front of the structure was renovated. The work was all gratis and was shared equally by the town and the surrounding district. The operation of this rink was now placed under the trusteeship of E. E. Hawes, George Lawrence, Delmar Wilson and Lorne Whiteside.

During the season of 1942-43, a hockey team coached by Reg Noble was the inspiration which gave impetus to the team that almost brought O.R.H.A. honors to Alliston the following two seasons. This team, all married, was composed of the following: Ross Williams, Jack Bowerman, Dr. Ybung, Norman Bray, Everett Hicks, Barney Gibson, Mint Storey, George Craig, William Wilson and Chuck Collins.

Two years later a hockey team directed by Ross Williams as coach, Chuck Collins, manager, and Ross Cameron, secretarytreasurer, went into the final round of the O.R.H.A. only to be defeated by Cayuga. Opening with a league composed of Thornton, Everett, Beeton and Alliston, they won the opportunity of entering the play-offs against Milton. In the five game series, Alliston vanquished Milton after four games. Advancing one more step, they were pitted against Stayner, two games, goals to count. Stayner was eliminated on the round and they advanced into the finals. By this time intense interest had been aroused and Alliston and district closed up shop and went to the hockey match. Pitted against Cayuga the first game was played in Barrie, Alliston 4, Cayuga 1. A special train carried about 600 fans to Grimsby for the second game: Alliston 3, Cayuga 8. The third and final game was called at Revina Gardens in Toronto. By special C.P.R. trains and autos, Alliston followed its team to

This was the last team to play in the old Baycroft rink.

The next chance the fans had to cheer their hockey team was during the season of 1946-47, when a team managed by E. E. Hawes and coached by Reg. Noble again was eliminated in the final round. This team made up of the following: Chuck Collins, Oscar Asaph, Mint Storey, Steve Milne, Ralph Hunter, Norman Scott, Keith Chantler, Liam Whalen, Eddie Noble, Dr. Young, Gib. Bradbury, J. C. Hunter, Nels Malcolm, George Hughson and Danny Heydon, after winning in their own group, went into the first round against St. Jacobs with two games, one played in Thoronton and one in Waterloo. Alliston won the round. This placed Alliston against Crowland who eliminated our boys in two games, one at Thoronton and one at Port Colborne.

The four trustees were still in charge when the rink was closed in 1945, after consulting with a prominent engineer. While there was great difference of opinion as to the wisdom of closing Compliments of



this rink, their action was justified by the fact that the roof caved in under weight of snow in January, 1946. The remains of this historic structure were sold to A. Bates for \$400.

To give credit where credit is due, it might be in order to say that in 1949 our baseball team, the members of which were: J. Taylor, D. Graham, A. Jennings, D. Heydon, R. Bleay, T. Beyers, K. Chantler, D. Wright, J. Ney, L. Purchase, N. Scott, R. Seeney and G. Crawford, won the Davis Memorial Trophy presented by Miss Norma Davis in memory of her brother, Flt. Sgt. Lawrance Davis. The trophy is awarded annually to the South Simcoe Baseball League Champions.



Also in the same year, a box lacrosse team, composed of H. Robins, D. Alderson, B. Crawford, M. Storey, E. Woodrow, R. Hunter, C. Whalen, L. Whalen, K. Chantler, L. Purchase, M. McKenzie, T. Beyers, E. Noble, R. McLean, J. Horsburg, T. Briggs, R. Williams and O. Asaph, won the Lacrosse Trophy of their district.

With facilities for hockey in Alliston gone, the citizens of Thornton offered their rink as home ice for Alliston. This was accepted and our hockey fans followed the team to Thornton.

Because this arrangement was but temporary, a movement began at once for the errection of a new arena. The council of 1946, with W. Hunter, mayor; J. D. Bowerman, reeve; L. Whiteside, Ross Williams, Sidney Knight, F. S. Hackett, H. Solomon and W. T. Alderson as councillors, visited a number of rinks and made many inquiries in order to acquaint themselves with the type of structure that would serve the needs of this community. They were able to place before the electors, in 1947, a by-law asking them to approve the issuing of a \$70,000 debenture.

It was felt this amount was necessary to build an arena which would serve the present and future needs of this community. The by-law was carried by a very substantial majority. During 1948, council was unable to get a contract that would conform with its plans and means. While good progress was made during that year, it was the council of 1949, composed of W. Hunter, mayor; W. Cunningham, reeve; Lorne Whiteside, Ross Williams, F. S. Hackett, Dr. Smockum, Delmar Wilson and Don Bowen as councillors, who began and brought into being the Alliston Memorial Arena which we have the honor of opening today. The committee responsible for the opening and operation of this building is: J. D. Bowerman, Russell Hood, J. R. Williams, Joe McCarroll, Delmar Wilson, M. Downey and W. T. Alderson.

The building, of fabricated steel construction with concrete block walls and built up roof, is 106 feet wide and 250 feet long. The cost of this structure to date is about \$83,000, exclusive of the artificial ice plant. The estimated cost of the ice plant, excluding floor, will be about \$25,500.



Alliston Phone 136 Toronto Phone LYndhurst 8142 The ice surface of 80 feet by 180 feet is of regulation size and is bordered on two sides by tiers of seats which can accomodate 700 persons. A catwalk behind these seats provides standing room for another 800 spectators. At the south end are seven rows of seats with a capacity of 500 and at the rear provision is made for band accommodation. Underneath seats at the south west corner is the artificial ice plant which, when operating, will allow skating 12 months in the year if necessary. The entire piping will be covered with a special asphalt floor.

At the north end of the ice surface is a two-story building 40 by 106 feet. The ground floor provides team dressing rooms, facilities for men and women skaters, offices, snack bar, lobby, heating system and two ticket offices. On the second floor is an auditorium 40 by 80 feet, equipped with stage, dressing rooms and kitchen. The seating capacity is about 400 and it is hoped that this room may be used for banquets, plays and public meetings. The layout is such that the hall and the rink can both be used at the same time without conflict. Entrances, two in number, are placed at either end of the front of the building while at the rear is a door large enough to permit trucks to enter the

building. The ice surface is lighted by 48 lamps, each of 500 candle power. It is hoped that a four-sided electric clock will be in place for the opening.

With the completion of this project, it is the hope of those who have so willingly and liberally contributed of their time, talents and money to make this undertaking possible, that present and future generations will put the same zeal into the successful operation of this centre so that its value to the community may be enjoyed to the fullest extent.

The close of these memoirs would not be complete unless thanks were accorded to several bodies and irdividuals: first, the council of 1949 who gave the final go-ahead signal for the project; secondly, the building committee of Ross Williams, chairman; Delmar Wilson, Dr. Smockum and L. Whiteside; thirdly, all those of the town and surrounding community who gave so freely of their time from the driving of the first stakes that marked the outline of the edifice, to the climax of our ambition, the official opening of the completed building; and lastly, the old boys and girls of Alliston, the citizens of the Townships of Essa, Tossorontio, Adjala, Tecumseth and of the Town of Alliston, who by their contributions of money made possible the artificial ice plant of which we are all so justly proud.



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

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
